Hosted by the Center for New Designs in Learning and Scholarship (CNDLS), this annual event engages Georgetown educators from various disciplines, departments, and schools for the purpose of discussing trends in higher education, sharing teaching innovations, and learning from experts within our teaching and learning community.

Three critical issues in higher education guided this year's program: the challenges and opportunities of artificial intelligence, dialogue and free speech on college campuses, and designing experiential learning opportunities. Keynote speakers and plenaries, invited workshop leaders, faculty and student panels, and practical workshops speaking to these themes underscored Georgetown's commitment to understanding and shaping the evolving landscape of higher education.



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
ATTENDANCE


